Our M.Ed. program in Counselor Education with a concentration in School Counseling is designed to prepare candidates to become able and responsive counselors for students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade. School counselors promote K-12 students' academic, career, and personal/social well-being through counseling, classroom guidance lessons, consulting, and a variety of other helping strategies. Augusta University's school counseling program is nationally accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) and approved by the Georgia Professional Standards Commission.

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Overview of Admission Requirements



GPA	At least a 2.5 undergraduate GPA	
Criminal Background Check	Passage of a criminal background check. See COE Graduate Program section of catalog for complete requirements.	
GRE or MAT Assessment	 Acceptable scores on the GRE or MAT. Scores must be less than 5 years old. Graduate Record Exam (GRE): A minimum score of 300 on the test overall or a score of at least 146 on the verbal subtest Miller's Analogy Test (MAT): A minimum score of 388 	
GACE Exam or Exemption	Acceptable score on the Georgia Assessments for the Certification of Educators (GACE) or exemption from GACE based on SAT, ACT or GRE scores. Scores must be less than 5 years old. • GACE: A minimum score of 250 • SAT: A composite of 1000 using verbal and math scores • ACT: A composite of 43 using verbal and quantitative scores • GRE: A combined score of 297 using verbal and quantitative scales	
Letters of Recommendation	Applicants will include at least three professional recommendations using specified forms.	
Autobiographical Essay	Applicants will write an autobiographical essay in which they discuss their reasons for wanting to become a counselor, what attributes they may possess which would contribute to their effectiveness as a counselor, what personal characteristics they possess that might hinder their relationships with clients, and how they are planning to address those issues. The essay must be double-spaced and three pages in length.	
Personal Interview	The personal interview with the faculty is the final requirement for full admission into the program. Shortly after the admissions deadline, faculty will select applicants to be invited to the interview based on the quality of the previous criteria. The interview is designed to assess applicants' potential for forming effective interpersonal relationships in individual and group contexts; openness to self-examination and personal and professional growth; potential to develop knowledge, skills and dispositions in the field; potential to work effectively with diverse populations; emotional stability; receptiveness to supervision; degree to which the Program's objectives and mission are consistent with the vocational and professional goals of applicants; and the degree to which applicants display the potential for success in the counseling program and profession.
